FOURTH ANNUAL ST. JEAN-BAPTISTE DAY CELEBRATION AT FRENCHTOWN SITE JUNE 20

The Frenchtown Historical Foundation (FHF) will present the fourth annual St. Jean-Baptiste Day Celebration on Saturday, June 20, 2015 at the Frenchtown Historic Site (8364 W. Old Highway 12).

St. Jean-Baptiste Day has been observed annually since 1834 throughout Canada and parts of the U.S. to honor the birthday of Quebec's patron saint, Jean-Baptiste, and French-Canadian culture. Our event will include music, song and dance as well as a cabin tour and weaving demonstration. A community meal is also planned.

The event begins at 3:00 p.m. with an introduction of St. Jean-Baptiste Day, Frenchtown and the cabin tour. At 3:30 p.m., guests may leave for the cabin tour or stay on site for other programs such as shake splitting, weaving demonstrations and songs of the fur trade. At 5:00 p.m. there will be tours of the Frenchtown Historic Site, including tours of the cemetery and the Prince's cabin. A community meal is scheduled for approximately 5:30 p.m. and will be provided by FHF. The event will end with some closing remarks by board president Rich Monacelli covering our endowment campaign and this year's Frenchtown Rendezvous. Lastly, guests are invited to dance with members of the Walla Walla Friends of Acoustic Music starting at 7:00 p.m. with an introduction to contra dancing, followed by a contra dance program from 7:30-10:00 p.m.

All programs associated with the fourth annual St. Jean-Baptiste Day Celebration are free and open to the public.

Last year's celebration featured songs and presentations by the Voyageurs & Co. from Vancouver, British Columbia. This year we are honored to welcome master weaver and Walla Walla tribal elder Joey Lavadour to demonstrate his ancient art. Lavadour has worked with wool and hemp twine from the Pendleton Woolen Mills to produce stunning traditional and modern basket designs.

TOUR OF FRENCHTOWN CABIN SITES ON JUNE 20

The fourth annual St. Jean-Baptiste Day Cabin Tour will be presented by the Frenchtown Historical Foundation on Saturday, June 20, at 3:00 p.m. with an introduction at the Frenchtown Historic Site. A bus will transport the tour party to six cabin locations between the Frenchtown Historic Site and Whitman Mission. Tour guides Sam Pambrun and Dan Clark will indicate the likely location and family history of each cabin. The list of cabin sites and families include Marcel and Rosalie Dauphin Gagnon, Narcisse and Pauline Walla Walla Raymond, Jerry Desire and Rosalie Raymond St. Denis, Charles and Julie Beauchemin, Louis and Angelique Pendoreille Tellier as well as Michael and Catherine D'Aubuchan Pellisier. Information sheets regarding cabin sites and families will be distributed. The bus, provided by Walla Walla University, will return to the Frenchtown Historic Site before 5:00 p.m. for additional St. Jean-Baptiste Day activities. The cabin tour is free and open to the public.

TRIBAL BLESSING OF THE PRINCE'S CABIN

New to the Frenchtown Historic Site is the relocation and restoration of the Prince's cabin. Built for the Cayuse Chief Prince in 1837 by French Canadien Metis of the Hudson's Bay Company, this cabin is apparently the oldest wooden structure still standing in the state of Washington. A tribal blessing of the cabin occurred on October 4, 2014. Various members of the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation were in attendance. Kriss Peterson was also in attendance and presented with a gift from the Frenchtown Historical Foundation. Kriss and her late husband Rev. Robin Peterson were the cabin's previous owners.

Prior to his death in 2011, Robin had performed extensive research on the history of the cabin and planned to move it to a more prominent location on his property where it would be restored and serve as a center for cultural reconciliation. Following Robin's death, Kriss Peterson offered the cabin to the Frenchtown Historical Foundation on the condition that it be moved to and displayed at the Frenchtown Historic Site.

THE BERGEVIN LETTERS PRESENTED BY PROF. SARAH HURLBURT

Sarah Hurlburt, FHF board member and associate professor of French at Whitman College, lectured on the Bergevins letters during Museum After Hours at Fort Walla Walla on April 30. She lectured on the same topic as the keynote speaker at the Frenchtown Rendezvous in September 2014. Her research concerning the Bergevins, an early Frenchtown family, involved the careful interpretation and better understanding of the French-Canadian experience. The Bergevin letters contained multiple examples and references to correspondence involving children and adolescents. These letters ranged from youth learning how to write, to long messages written on behalf of entire families, to letters exchanged directly between cousins. The content and function of these written interactions provided a window onto the interpretive role of children in the immigrant experience. These children may have interpreted between written and oral communication for an illiterate parent, or between languages for a monolingual parent, or attempted to reproduce the close epistolary relationships of their parents' generation with cousins. Examples of these interactions in the Bergevin letters demonstrated the value placed on distant family relationships in the French-Canadian community and the evolution imposed on these relationships by immigration.
